On behalf of the Lunenburg County Board of Supervisors, I would like to congratulate Animal Control Officer, Ray Elliott, for the exceptional efforts he made during his "Ruff-N-IT" Spay/Neuter Campaign. Officer Elliott began his duties with the County in May 2014 and has grown into an exemplary employee.

Though, Officer Elliott has always been a reliable, honest, positive and diligent employee, his work on the "Ruff-N-IT" Spay/Neuter Campaign surpassed all expectation. His goal was to raise awareness of the importance of spaying and neutering companion animals. 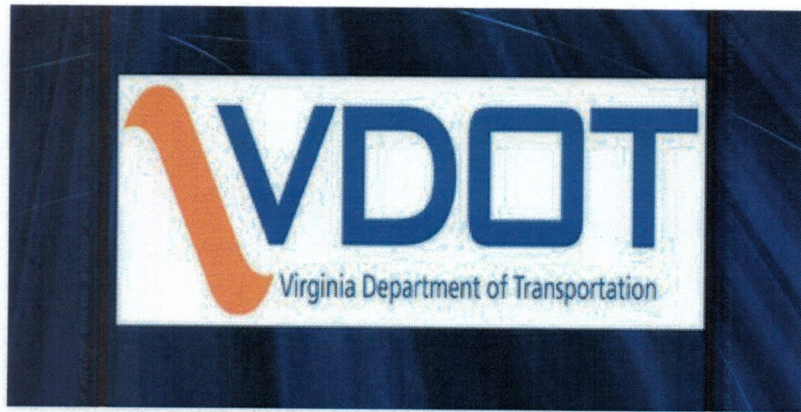

Hounds with Hunting Trucks, Shooting, Flassing Traffic
drunking on Roads.
Hunters are running along side of Roads with guns
loaded.

3. Hunting Trucks - Hunters have tracking devices
in Trucks and on the collar of Hounds to chase
or track the Hounds on our Roads For miles.
This is the abuse that Shooting and blocking Roads
comes from. also Trucks have many CB antennas
or 2 way Radio Scanners in Trucks to track
local law enforcement departments.
This is a big Issue when we call our law officials

to report these abuses, and Hunters picks this signal up and let other Hunters know to leave the area before officers gets here.

You can see Hunters are using their Trucks as Hunting devices to track, chase Hounds and shoot off of Roads.

Block Roads

These Hunters are playing very dangerous games on our Roads!

4. Trespassing - Hunters in Violation of privacy rights coming onto private posted property (Homes) to pick up their Hounds without owners permission.

5. Hunt Clubs - all of the above that I have wrote about.

These men that are members of Hunt Clubs should not be in our neighborhoods.

When officers are called out here these Hunters get very disrespectful to owners.

My Husband and I have been Verbally abused, and threaten using profanity and destruction of our property and littering. I think this is called retaliation by these men. (Serious Behavior problems)

I will not say all of Hunters are this way but what we have experience here is totally unacceptable.

and you can see why other property owners do not want to come forward in these matters.

I strongly believe that Hunting does not belong on our Roads but in the woods!

Landfill Liaison Report - Carl Ashworth
August 1, 2018
July 2018 Report

CFS Landfill:

1. Construction began on July 10, 2018 for the new cell. The grading portion is close to completion.
2. They have been able to exceed the two weeks of cover dirt required on the working face and top of the landfill. Baker Construction hauled dirt to the top of the landfill from their grading project.
3. We are still awaiting the return of the DEQ inspector to finish his last inspection.

Citizen Complaints:

1. None reported

Comments:

1. Construction crews are working seven days a week on the landfill expansion.
2. CFS will execute a controlled burn for the bush brought into the landfill in the next several weeks.

Convenience Sites:

1. The number 2 compactor at Switchback Convenience site had to be shut down and cleaned to repair a leaking hydraulic hose. Those repairs have been completed and the compactor is back online.

Citizen Complaints:

1. Several citizens complained of an offensive odor around the compactors at the Owl Creek convenience site. We have applied lime to the affected areas around the compactors.

Comments:

1. We detected a hole in the floor of the Owl Creek compactor causing fluid to leak out of the compactor creating the offensive odor. I contacted Tim Webb requesting repairs or a replacement can be installed. He will send someone to evaluate the can's condition. It will either be repaired or replaced.

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At a meeting of the Board of Supervisors, held in and for the County of Mecklenburg, on July 9, 2018, in the Board of Supervisors meeting room of the Goode Bank Building, the Board, by a unanimous vote, adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

SUPPORT FOR SALES TAX REVENUE FOR SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENTS

Whereas, in 2013 the Virginia General Assembly approved a sales tax increase in certain localities for Infrastructure Development from 5.3 to 6.0 percent to relieve traffic congestion, making available billions of dollars of local funding for infrastructure; and

Whereas, Virginia collects 5.3 percent of sales taxes with 1 percent of that going to the locality, currently representing approximately 3.6 million dollars annually going to Mecklenburg County; and

Whereas, school building needs in many Virginia localities including Mecklenburg County have become as acute a problem as traffic congestion in Northern Virginia and Hampton Roads; and

Whereas, rural localities in general lack an adequate tax base to support and fund major capital needs; and

Whereas, school children living in rural areas of Virginia should not be at a disadvantage as compared to other localities in attending safe, healthy school buildings; and

Whereas, the funding of capital projects constricts local school system operating funding and infringes on money for teacher pay and public safety; and

Whereas, state sales tax dollars invested in local construction projects would make available more local dollars to invest in the operation of schools, including more competitive teacher pay and meeting other pressing needs; and

Whereas, state sales revenue specifically earmarked for school funding would allow a locality to spend local property tax dollars on such needed areas as public safety, school operating budget and refuse collection and disposal; and


Whereas, sales tax revenue specifically designed for school infrastructure funding should not be counted towards the Local Required Effort for educational funding; and

Whereas, it is in the interest of having a thriving public education system that any enabling legislation guarantees that localities cannot supplant funding from the schools' operational budgets if new revenue is generated from a school infrastructure sales tax; and

Whereas, state enabling legislation is legally required for an additional sales tax which would be expressly dedicated to public school capital project funding; and

Whereas, each locality should obtain the support of its community by way of referendum approving any local sales tax increase for school improvement and construction;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that the Mecklenburg County Board of Supervisors does hereby resolve and express its support and desire for the Virginia General Assembly to enact such legislation as is necessary to permit localities to charge additional sales tax, conditioned upon a local referendum approving such sales tax, with the revenue generated thereby being returned to the localities for the express and exclusive purpose of providing funding for public school capital improvement and building purposes, with no dilution of Local Required Effort towards educational operational funding. Once a project for which a referendum is held and approved is completed and all attendant debt satisfied by the increased sales tax and other available revenue sources, the additional sales tax would cease to be charged.

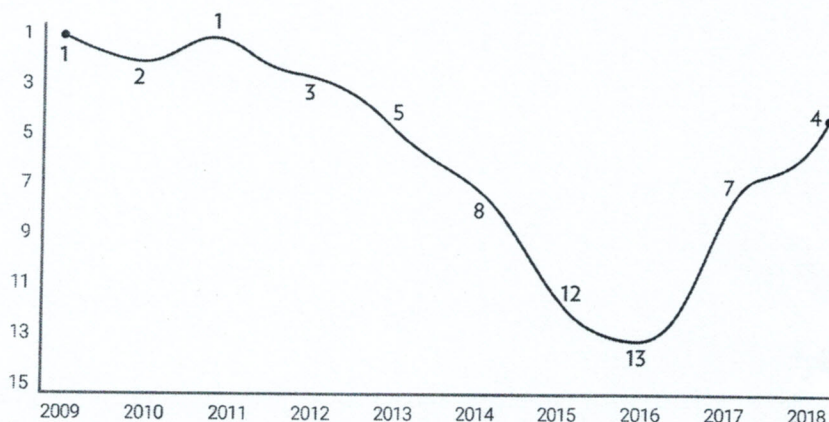
How Virginia Performed:

VIRGINIA'S 2018 RANKINGS:

Virginia ranked 4th overall this year, improving from 7th in 2017. Top-ranked states are primarily characterized by dynamic economic growth, the strength of technology and innovation ecosystems, and the education level and availability of workers. Some of the most successful states have been proactive implementing economic development programs designed to attract new investment (such as shovel-ready sites programs, strong incentives, and marketing and branding budgets), efforts to commercialize university research, and investments in customized workforce development programs and labor market information infrastructure. Virginia's overall improvement in recent years has been driven primarily by substantial improvements in measures of economic growth, cost of living, and infrastructure. The table below summarizes the Commonwealth's performance in each category from 2016 to 2018.

Top Opportunity For Virginia To Improve Its Position:

Enact targeted state/local tax reforms to reduce tax burdens for new and expanding businesses, which would substantially improve Virginia's poor ranking (#34) for Cost of Doing Business. Virginia is relatively unique in that it is a relatively low tax state for existing firms but a relatively high tax state for new firms and business expansions due to the lack of by-right statutory tax credits/exemptions to encourage job creation and investment.

Administration

- Stayed up-to-date on all operations by checking emails and calling in to the office on a near daily basis. Clocked about 65 hours while on maternity leave.
- Received bid for spraying herbicide on the cutover at the Lunenburg Commercentre (which will be completed by August 10th), will receive bids for reforestation on the 17th. I've stayed in touch with Kenbridge about our progress.

Airport

- Hard Times Tree Service should complete tree removal by August 10th due to rain delays.

Budget & Finance –

- Finalized budget information and working on keying in figures and reviewing for necessary adjustments for FY17-18.
- Had to purchase 911 and County Hardware backup batteries for about \$15,000. This was unexpected, but must be done to keep all systems operational in the case of a power outage. 911 systems were down for several minutes when the battery backup failed a few weeks ago. We will also purchase additional battery backups for the smaller hardware/software to ensure coverage.

- After multiple requests, attorney intervention, and correspondence with CFS regarding unpaid annual payments, monthly host fees for the last three months, with accrued penalties and interest, as of 7-31-18 CFS is now up-to-date on host agreement payments. Personal property taxes are still outstanding.
- Waiting on an updated site plan with requirements from VDOT from the engineer for the potential Gary Road site. Surveyor must show potential stormwater run-off options.
- I spent the morning with Carl Ashworth at the landfill discussing and viewing the current cell and construction of the new cell. It is an impressive operation and sight. They are doing a great job of keeping the hills clean, trash covered, and the road clear. I would be happy to set up a time for you to visit and view the facility.
- I am setting up a Citizens Advisory Board meeting

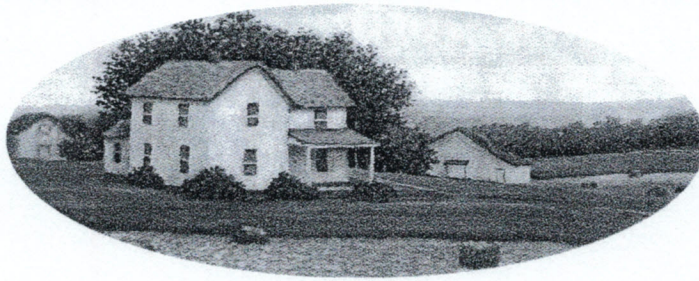

SUBJECT: CRC Staff Update – Providing Grant Writing Services to Lunenburg County School System

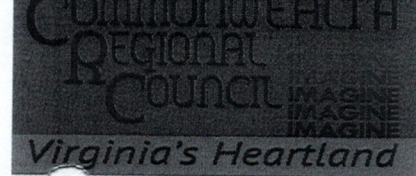
As part of the CRC's ongoing efforts to provide grant writing services for Lunenburg County Public Schools, the following activities have taken place since June 12, 2018:

- We are working in an application to the Baseball Tomorrow Fund for funds to construct new ball fields. We have much of the required information and will be putting the application together in advance of the next deadline (October 1).
- I provided an update to Charles Berkley, Superintendent, on the next round of grants from the Lowe's Toolbox for Education Program, which could be used to fund STEM/STEAM activities and building/grounds improvements. The next round of applications will open on August 6.
- I passed on information to Mr. Berkley about the Virginia Early Childhood Foundation's next round of Mixed-Delivery Preschool grants, which allow local communities to field-test strategies and solutions to barriers that prevent eligible children from participating in Virginia's preschool initiative. Proposals are due by October 8.

The Lunenburg/Kenbridge/Victoria Comp Plan Working Committee made some revisions to the Goals, Objectives and Strategies section during the June 28, 2018 meeting. Those revisions have been made and returned to the Working Committee for final review before inserting them into the Draft Comprehensive Plan 2019 – 2024 (Update).

The CRC 2010 Regional Bicycle Plan has been submitted to each locality for consideration and adoption. Again, by adopting the Plan a locality can be eligible for future grant funding in certain areas.

Today, the Special Policy Areas section of the Comp Plan was sent to the Working Committee for review and will be addressed at the next meeting.

Please note that each chief administrator for Lunenburg County, the Town of Kenbridge and the Town of Victoria has been asked to provide Capital Improvement information for the Comprehensive Plan.

The Joint Comprehensive Plan Update Meeting is scheduled for October 11, 2018 (Members of the Lunenburg County Board of Supervisors & Planning Commission, Kenbridge Town Council & Planning Commission and the Victoria Town Council & Planning Commission should be in attendance to provide input).

The CRC is still continuing to update key items in the Plan, as well as adding some new information from the Working Committee meetings.

The next Working Committee meeting is scheduled for August 9, 2018 at 3:30 p.m. at the Victoria Town Hall.
