**LUNENBURG COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS**

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE COUNTY OF LUNENBURG, VIRGINIA TO IMPLEMENT “REVENUE SHARE FOR SOLAR ENERGY PROJECTS AND ENERGY STORAGE SYSTEMS” PURSUANT TO VA. CODE ANN. § 58.1-2636**

WHEREAS, Va. Code Ann. §58.1-2636 titled “Revenue Share for Solar Energy Projects and Energy Storage Systems” is effective July 1, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Va. Code Ann §58.1-2636 authorizes any locality to adopt an ordinance to assess a revenue share of up to \$1,400.00 per megawatt, as measured in alternating current (AC) generation capacity of the solar energy project or storage capacity, based on submissions by the facility owners to the interconnecting utility, on any solar photovoltaic (electric energy) project or energy storage system, and subject to certain exemptions set out in Va. Code §58.1-2636; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to amend the Code of the County of Lunenburg to implement the provisions of Va. Code Ann §58.1-2636, as amended.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Lunenburg County Board of Supervisors as follows:

1. To add Article VI titled “Revenue Share for Solar Energy Projects and Energy Storage Systems” to Chapter 70 titled “Taxation” to be numbered 156 through 158 of the Code of the County of Lunenburg as follows:

**Article VI “Revenue Share for Solar Energy Projects and Energy Storage Systems”**

**Sec. 70-156. Purpose, Definition, Relation to Other Ordinances.**

- (a) The purpose of this article is to implement Va. Code Ann. § 58.1-2636, as amended, titled “Revenue Share for Solar Energy Projects and Energy Storage Systems”.
- (b) Terms used in this article shall have the defined meanings found in Va. Code Ann. §§ 58.1-2636, 58.1-3660, 58.1-3507, or 58.1-3508.6, as amended.
- (c) To the extent that the provisions of this article conflict with any other prior ordinance or provision of the Code of the County of Lunenburg, this article shall control.

**Sec. 70-157. Applicability.**

- (a) This Article shall apply to all solar photovoltaic (electric energy) systems except those:
  - (i) Described in § 56-594, 56-594.01, or 56-594.2 or Chapters 358 and 382 of the Acts of Assembly of 2013, as amended;
  - (ii) 20 megawatts or less, as measured in alternating current (AC) generation capacity, for which an initial interconnection request form has been filed with an electric utility or a regional transmission organization on or before December 31, 2018; or
  - (iii) Five megawatts or less.

- (b) This Article shall not apply to any solar photovoltaic (electric energy) project or storage energy system for which an application was filed with the County and approved by the County prior to January 1, 2021.

**Sec. 70-158. Revenue Share Rate Per Megawatt and Waiver of Machinery and Tool Tax.**

- (a) The County hereby imposes a revenue share to be assessed at a rate of \$1,400.00 per megawatt on any solar photovoltaic (energy) project or energy storage system, which rate shall be increased by 10 percent on July 1, 2026, and every 5 years thereafter by 10 percent. The generation or storage capacity shall be measured in alternating current (AC) generation or storage capacity of the facility and the determination of the generation or storage capacity shall be based on submissions by the facility owner to the interconnecting utility.
- (b) The exemption for solar photovoltaic (electric energy) projects and energy storage systems greater than five megawatts as provided by Va. Code Ann. § 58.1-3660, as amended, shall be one hundred percent (100%) of the assessed value.
- (c) Nothing contained herein shall be construed to prevent any other tax or fee as provided by the Code of Virginia.

2. This Ordinance shall become effective on June 10, 2021.

## LUNENBURG COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

### ORDINANCE TO ADD LUNENBURG CODE § 70-8

Pursuant to Va. Code § 58.1-3651, the Lunenburg Board of Supervisors does hereby declare that property owned by volunteer fire departments, volunteer emergency medical service agencies and any auxiliary agencies thereof located within Lunenburg County shall hereby be designated as charitable organizations and exempt from real or personal property taxes. The specific purpose in which the exemption is based is that these volunteer organizations provide valuable emergency relief to the Lunenburg citizens and their property and for the common good of the public. So long as these organizations maintain this specific purpose, they shall enjoy such tax exemption. In considering this Ordinance, the Lunenburg County Board of Supervisors has considered the following:

1. That the organizations are exempt from taxation pursuant to § 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954;
2. That there is no current annual alcoholic beverage license for serving alcoholic beverages has been issued by the Board of Directors of the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Authority to such organization, for use on such property;
3. That no director, officer, or employee of the organization is paid compensation in excess of a reasonable allowance for salaries or other compensation for personal services which such director, officer, or employee actually renders;
4. That no net earnings of such organization inures to the benefit of any individual, and whether any significant portion of the service provided by such organization is generated by funds received from donations, contributions, or local, state or federal grants. As used in this subsection, donations shall include the providing of personal services or the contribution of in-kind or other material services;
5. That the organization provides services for the common good of the public;

6. That there is no part of the activities of the organization that involves carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation and whether the organization participates in, or intervenes in, any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office;

7. That the revenue impact to the locality and its taxpayers of exempting the property is minimal; and

8. That the service provided by the agencies to Lunenburg County is invaluable and is to be commended.

On May 18, 2021 the Planning Commission recommended approval of CUP 3-21 with the following conditions:

1. Adhere to the fire code maximum occupancy for the existing structure present on the parcel.
2. Provide adequate room for fire, EMS, and law enforcement (first responders) to enter and exit the facility, parking area, and/or remainder of the parcel. Also, ensuring adequate access to surrounding parcels/properties.
3. Security present at all times an event to control crowd, noise, and physical and/or verbal violence. Lack of security present should result in the ability to host the event.
4. The existing structure is required to meet Building Code and pass inspection prior to operation. All required building permits must be obtained.
5. Events with greater than one-hundred (100) people require an Event Permit to be obtained through the County Administration Office. Events with one-hundred (100) or less people do not require an Event Permit.
  - a. Failure to obtain permits, when required, will result in the suspension or revocation of the Conditional Use Permit.
6. Comply with Virginia Department of Health's (VDH) rules and regulations for Food Service Operations, including, but not limited to, passing any and



all inspections, obtaining necessary permits, and comply with any other terms or conditions of the Virginia Department of Health (VDH).

- a. Provide verification of compliance to the Office of Planning and Economic Development.
7. Events occurring on Friday and Saturday nights are required to end promptly at 1:00 a.m. and those Sunday through Thursday are required to end promptly at 10:00 p.m.
8. Ingress, egress, and regress plans are required to be provided to the Lunenburg County Sheriff's Department within thirty (30) days prior to operation of the facility. The plans should be in accordance to the Virginia Department of Transportation rules and regulations.
  - a. Proof of compliance to be submitted to the Office of Planning and Economic Development.
9. A limit of twelve (12) events per month.
  - a. Provide a schedule of events, if requested from the Office of Planning and Economic Development.
- 10.No overnight accommodations.
- 11.Adhere to the Lunenburg County noise ordinance. (*Chapter 58, Article III, Sections 76 through 84 of the Lunenburg County Code.*)
- 12.No alcohol is permitted on the premises of tax parcel 034-0A-0-70.
- 13.The conditional use permit is limited to the applicants (Mr. Wesley and Mrs. Cassandra Williams) and does not run with the property.

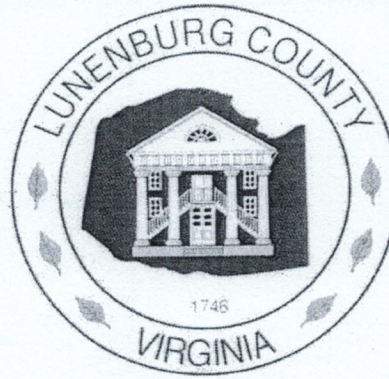

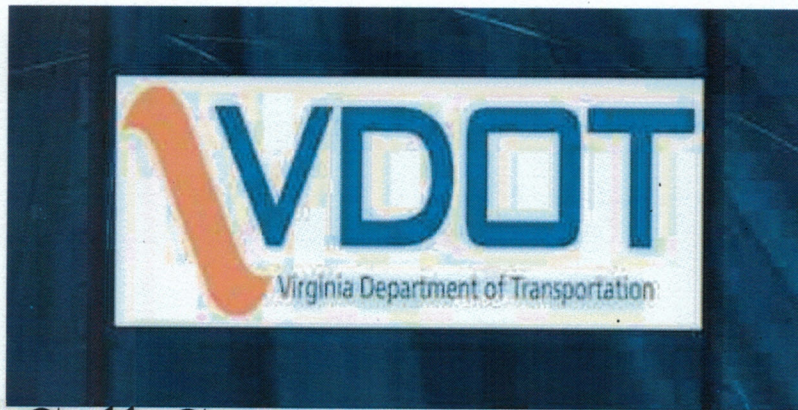

Dear Members of the Board, Mrs. Gee, and Mr. Rennie,

I am in receipt of a copy of the letter to the County of Lunenburg from Southern Dominion Health System, Inc. dated May 20, 2021.

The primary duty of the Commissioner of the Revenue is to ensure that taxes are assessed equitably and uniformly. Though we have never taxed SDHS, we have taxed other medical offices in the county. Thus, I contacted SDHS and addressed the situation, informing them that we will need to correct this. This, in turn, prompted the letter to the Board from SDHS.

To my knowledge, SDHS, Inc., formerly Lunenburg County Community Health Center, Inc., has not been assessed real or personal property taxes. I have searched through archived records; each record relating to SDHS says they are tax exempt. However, I cannot find a record of *why* they have never been taxed. SDHS indicated that there was an "agreement" that they would be tax exempt, but I cannot find a written agreement, nor can the health center locate one.

There are three other localities in which Southern Dominion Health System has offices. We four Commissioners discussed the issue, and all determined that they are not tax exempt by Virginia Code. There does not appear to be anything in the ordinances of Lunenburg County that exempts them from taxation.

I look forward to working with you to resolve this issue.



### Marijuana Legalization Issues

1. During the 2021 General Assembly session, the Virginia General Assembly legalized marijuana use, possession and sale in Virginia. It is important to understand the Marijuana Legalization Bill since it could potentially impact Lunenburg County and its citizens.

2. The Marijuana Legalization Bill is very exhaustive. The bill itself contains 283 pages. The bill legalizes possession and use for small amounts of marijuana for people over the age of 21. This law will take effect July 1, 2021. For people under the age of 21, the fine for using marijuana is \$25. There are restrictions for marijuana usage in schools and other places similar to restrictions on the consumption of alcohol and smoking cigarettes.

3. Of particular importance to the Lunenburg Board of Supervisors is retail sales of marijuana in the county. Under the current legislation, marijuana retail sales outlets can be opened and operated in the county after January 1, 2024.

4. Under the new legislation, the General Assembly allows the local governing body to present a referendum to the county voters on whether retail sales establishments should be prohibited in Lunenburg County. The particular Code section that governs a referendum on this issue is not effective until July 1, 2022. It is important to note that the referendum must be completed prior to January 1, 2023. That means that a referendum petition would need to be presented to the Lunenburg Circuit Court after July 1, 2022 but before September 1, 2022, with the actual referendum appearing on the general election ballot in November, 2022.

5. If it is the Board's decision to move forward with a referendum, I will place it on my calendar to pursue an Order of Referendum from the Lunenburg Circuit Court after July 1, 2022.

6. I'm sure as the legislation takes effect on July 1, 2021, there will be more issues and questions about marijuana possession, usage and sale. I have attached the Virginia Code sections that apply to the marijuana retail sales referendum.

Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions.

A. No Board member may be sued civilly for doing or omitting to do any act in the performance of his duties as prescribed by this subtitle, except by the Commonwealth, and then only in the Circuit Court of the City of Richmond. Such proceedings by the Commonwealth shall be instituted and conducted by the Attorney General.

B. The Board may, in the name of the Commonwealth, be sued in the Circuit Court of the City of Richmond to enforce any contract made by it or to recover damages for any breach thereof. The Board may defend the proceedings and may institute proceedings in any court. No such proceedings shall be taken against, or in the names of, the members of the Board.

**§ 4.1-626. Counsel for members, agents, and employees of Board.**

If any member, agent, or employee of the Board shall be arrested, indicted, or otherwise prosecuted on any charge arising out of any act committed in the discharge of his official duties, the Board chairman may employ special counsel approved by the Attorney General to defend such member, agent, or employee. The compensation for special counsel employed pursuant to this section, shall, subject to the approval of the Attorney General, be paid in the same manner as other expenses incident to the administration of this subtitle are paid.

**§ 4.1-627. Hearings; representation by counsel.**

Any licensee or applicant for any license granted by the Board shall have the right to be represented by counsel at any Board hearing for which he has received notice. The licensee or applicant shall not be required to be represented by counsel during such hearing. Any officer or director of a corporation may examine, cross-examine, and question witnesses, present evidence on behalf of the corporation, and draw conclusions and make arguments before the Board or hearing officers without being in violation of the provisions of § 54.1-3904.

**§ 4.1-628. Hearings; allowances to witnesses.**

Witnesses subpoenaed to appear on behalf of the Board shall be entitled to the same allowance for expenses as witnesses for the Commonwealth in criminal cases in accordance with § 17.1-611. Such allowances shall be paid out of the fund from which other costs incurred by the Board are paid upon certification to the Comptroller.

**§ 4.1-629. Local referendum on prohibition of retail marijuana stores.**

A. The governing body of a locality may, by resolution, petition the circuit court for the locality for a referendum on the question of whether retail marijuana stores should be prohibited in the locality.

Upon the filing of a petition, the circuit court shall order the election officials to conduct a referendum on the question on the date fixed in the order. The date set by the order shall comply with the provisions of § 24.2-682, but in no event shall such date be more than 90 days from the date the order is issued. The clerk of the circuit court shall publish notice of the referendum in a newspaper of general circulation in the locality once a week for three consecutive weeks prior to the referendum.

The question on the ballot shall be:

"Shall the operation of retail marijuana stores be prohibited in \_\_\_\_\_ (name of county, city, or town)?"

The referendum shall be held and the results certified as provided in § 24.2-684. In addition to the certifications required by such section, the secretary of the local electoral board shall certify the results of the referendum to the Board of Directors of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority and to the governing body of the locality.

B. If a majority of the qualified voters voting in such referendum vote "No" on the question of whether retail marijuana stores shall be prohibited in the locality, retail marijuana stores shall be permitted to operate within the locality 60 days after the results are certified or on January 1, 2024, whichever is later, and no subsequent referendum may be held pursuant to this section within such locality.

If a majority of the qualified voters voting in such referendum vote "Yes" on the question of whether retail marijuana stores shall be prohibited in the locality, retail marijuana stores shall be prohibited in the locality effective January 1 of the year immediately following the referendum. A referendum on the same question may be held subsequent to a vote to prohibit retail marijuana stores but not earlier than four years following the date of the previous referendum. Any subsequent referendum shall be held pursuant to the provisions of this section.

C. When any referendum is held pursuant to this section in a town, separate and apart from the county in which such town or a part thereof is located, such town shall be treated as being separate and apart from such county. When any referendum is held pursuant to this section in a county, any town located within such county, shall be treated as being part of such county.

D. The legality of any referendum held pursuant to this enactment shall be subject to the inquiry, determination, and judgment of the circuit court that ordered the referendum. The court shall proceed upon the complaint of 15 or more qualified voters of the county, city, or town, filed within 30 days after the date the results of the referendum are certified and setting out fully the grounds of contest. The complaint and the proceedings shall conform as nearly as practicable to the provisions of § 15.2-1654 of the Code of Virginia, and the judgment of the court entered of record shall be a final determination of the legality of the referendum.

**§ 4.1-630. Local ordinances or resolutions regulating retail marijuana or retail marijuana products.**

A. No county, city, or town shall, except as provided in §§ 4.1-629 and 4.1-631, adopt any ordinance or resolution that regulates or prohibits the cultivation, manufacture, possession, sale, wholesale distribution, handling, transportation, consumption, use, advertising, or dispensing of retail marijuana or retail marijuana products in the Commonwealth.

B. However, the governing body of any county, city, or town may adopt an ordinance (i) that prohibits the acts described in § 4.1-1108, or the acts described in § 4.1-1109, and may provide a penalty for violation thereof and (ii) that regulates or prohibits the possession of opened retail marijuana or retail marijuana products containers in its local public parks, playgrounds, public streets, and any sidewalk adjoining any public street.

C. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to supersede or limit the authority of a locality to adopt and enforce local ordinances to regulate businesses licensed pursuant to this chapter, including local zoning and land use requirements and business license requirements.

D. Except as provided in this section, all local acts, including charter provisions and ordinances of counties, cities, and towns, inconsistent with any of the provisions of this subtitle, are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

**§ 4.1-631. Local ordinances regulating time of sale of retail marijuana and retail marijuana products.**

The governing body of each county may adopt ordinances effective in that portion of such county not embraced within the corporate limits of any incorporated town, and the governing body of each city and town may adopt ordinances effective in such city or town, fixing hours during which retail marijuana and retail marijuana products may be sold. Such governing bodies shall provide for fines and other penalties for violations of any such ordinances, which shall be enforced as if the violations were Class 1 misdemeanors with a right of appeal pursuant to § 16.1-106.

A copy of any ordinance adopted pursuant to this section shall be certified by the clerk of the governing body adopting it and transmitted to the Board.

On and after the effective date of any ordinance adopted pursuant to this section, no retail marijuana store shall sell retail marijuana and retail marijuana products during the hours limited by the ordinance.

CHAPTER 7.

ADMINISTRATION OF LICENSES; GENERAL PROVISIONS.

**§ 4.1-700. Exemptions from licensure.**

The licensure requirements of this subtitle shall not apply to (i) a cannabis dispensing facility or pharmaceutical processor that has been issued a permit by the Board of Pharmacy pursuant to Article 4.2 (§ 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of the Drug Control Act; (ii) a dealer, grower, or processor of industrial hemp registered with the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services pursuant to Chapter 41.1 (§ 3.2-4112 et seq.) of Title 3.2; (iii) a manufacturer of an industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract operating in accordance with Article 5 (§ 3.2-5145.1 et seq.) of Chapter 51 of Title 3.2 and subsection B of § 3.2-4122; or (iv) a person who cultivates marijuana at home for personal use pursuant to § 4.1-1101. Nothing in this subtitle shall be construed to (a) prevent any person described in clause (i), (ii), or (iii) from obtaining a license pursuant to this subtitle, provided such person satisfies applicable licensing requirements; (b) prevent a licensee from acquiring hemp products from an industrial hemp processor in accordance with the provisions

On receipt of the certificate of restoration of the right to register to vote from the Secretary of the Commonwealth, the petitioner, who is otherwise a qualified voter, shall become eligible to register to vote.

**§ 54.1-3442.8. Criminal liability; exceptions.**

No agent or employee of a pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility shall be prosecuted under *Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-248, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250, or 18.2-250.1* for possession or manufacture of marijuana or for possession, manufacture, or distribution of cannabis oil, subject to any civil penalty, denied any right or privilege, or subject to any disciplinary action by a professional licensing board if such agent or employee (i) possessed or manufactured such marijuana for the purposes of producing cannabis oil in accordance with the provisions of this article and Board regulations or (ii) possessed, manufactured, or distributed such cannabis oil in accordance with the provisions of this article and Board regulations.

3. That §§ 18.2-248.1, 18.2-250.1, and 18.2-251.1 of the Code of Virginia are repealed.

4. That, except as provided in the fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, seventeenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first, twenty-second, twenty-third, twenty-fourth, twenty-fifth, and twenty-sixth enactments of this act, the provisions of this act shall become effective on January 1, 2024.

5. That the provisions of § 4.1-629 of the Code of Virginia, as created by this act, shall become effective on July 1, 2022.

6. That, subject to the provisions of the eleventh and thirteenth enactments, the provisions of (i) §§ 4.1-630 and 4.1-631 of the Code of Virginia, as created by this act, and (ii) Chapter 7 (§ 4.1-700 et seq.), Chapter 8 (§ 4.1-800 et seq.), Chapter 9 (§ 4.1-900 et seq.), Chapter 10 (§ 4.1-1000 et seq.), Chapter 12 (§ 4.1-1200 et seq.), and Chapter 14 (§ 4.1-1400 et seq.) of Title 4.1 of the Code of Virginia, as created by this act, shall become effective on July 1, 2023.

7. The provisions of §§ 4.1-1101.1 and 4.1-1105.1 of the Code of Virginia, as created by this act, shall expire on January 1, 2024, if the provisions of the first, third, and fourth enactments of this act are reenacted by the 2022 Session of the General Assembly.

9. That the provisions of the first enactment amending §§ 19.2-389.3, 19.2-392.1, and 19.2-392.4 of the Code of Virginia and creating §§ 19.2-392.2:1 and 19.2-392.2:2 of the Code of Virginia shall become effective on the earlier of (i) the first day of the fourth month following notification to the Chairman of the Virginia Code Commission and the Chairmen of the Senate Committee on the Judiciary and the House Committee for Courts of Justice by the Superintendent of State Police that the Executive Secretary of the Supreme Court of Virginia, the Department of State Police, and any circuit court clerk who
